Objective

The primary objective of our study tour to Kerala was to immerse ourselves in the rich cultural diversity of India and gain insights into how various policies are implemented and their impact on the local population. Our journey across this beautiful state allowed us to explore the interplay between cultural heritage, natural beauty, and the evolving socio-economic landscape.



Day – 1: Hyderabad to Trivandrum – Veli Village

Our journey began with an early morning arrival in Trivandrum, the capital of Kerala. We were greeted by the humid tropical air and the vibrant energy of the city. Our first stop was the majestic ***Sri Padmanabhaswamy Temple***.

Sri Padmanabhaswamy Temple: Entering the temple complex felt like stepping back in time. The towering gopuram (entrance tower) adorned with intricate sculptures was our first glimpse into the architectural grandeur that lay within. We learned that the temple is one of the 108 sacred Vishnu temples, making it a significant pilgrimage site for Hindus. The temple's architecture is a blend of Kerala and Dravidian styles, with ornate carvings, expansive courtyards, and a seven-tiered gopuram. The atmosphere inside was serene and spiritual, with the scent of incense and the chanting of mantras filling the air. We witnessed devotees offering prayers and performing rituals, gaining insight into the temple's profound religious significance.



Veli Village: In the afternoon, we escaped the city bustle and traveled to the tranquil Veli Village. Here, the Veli Lake meets the Arabian Sea, creating a picturesque landscape. We spent time observing local fishermen casting their nets and enjoying the refreshing sea breeze. As the sun began to set, the sky transformed into a canvas of vibrant colors, casting a golden glow over the water. The peaceful ambiance and stunning sunset views provided a perfect end to our first day in Kerala.

Day 2: Alleppey

Our second day was dedicated to exploring the famed backwaters of *Alleppey*. We boarded a traditional Kerala houseboat, excited to experience life on the water.

Houseboat Cruise: The houseboat was beautifully crafted with wood and bamboo, offering comfortable interiors and a spacious deck. As we gently cruised through the narrow canals, we were surrounded by swaying palm trees, lush paddy fields, and charming villages. We observed local life unfolding along the waterways; children playing by the banks, women washing clothes, and fishermen skillfully navigating their canoes. The backwaters ecosystem was teeming with life – we spotted colorful kingfishers, graceful herons, and vibrant dragonflies. The meals served on board were delicious, featuring fresh fish and local Kerala specialties. We learned that these houseboats provide a livelihood for many locals, from the boatmen and cooks to the artisans who craft the boats.



Backwaters Ecosystem: During our cruise, we learned about the unique ecology of the backwaters. This intricate network of canals, lagoons, and lakes acts as a natural irrigation system for the surrounding paddy fields and coconut groves. It also supports a diverse range of flora and fauna, contributing significantly to the region's biodiversity.

Day 3: April 30th, 2024 - Periyar Lake & Munnar

Our third day began with a journey towards the highlands, starting with a visit to Periyar Lake.

Periyar National Park: We arrived at Periyar National Park, a haven for wildlife enthusiasts. Our boat ride on Periyar Lake offered stunning views of the surrounding hills draped in dense forests. We were fortunate to spot a herd of wild elephants grazing by the water's edge, a truly awe-inspiring sight. The park's role in conservation became evident as we learned about its efforts to protect endangered species like tigers, elephants, and Nilgiri tahr.



Journey to Munnar & Traditional Food: After our wildlife encounter, we began our journey to Munnar, a hill station renowned for its tea plantations. During the drive, we stopped at a local restaurant to savor a traditional Kerala meal. The food was a sensory delight, with aromatic spices, fresh coconut, and a variety of vegetarian and non-vegetarian dishes. We enjoyed the flavors of appam, stew, curry, and the sweet delicacy, payasam.




Day 4: - Munnar

Our exploration of Munnar's natural beauty continued with a visit to Eravikulam National Park.



* Eravikulam National Park & Nilgiri Tahr: Eravikulam National Park is a haven for biodiversity and is most famous for being home to the endangered Nilgiri Tahr. The Nilgiri Tahr is a type of wild goat endemic to the Western Ghats and is a symbol of the park's conservation efforts. We learned about the park's successful breeding programs and habitat restoration projects that have helped to increase the tahr population. The park's rolling hills and vast grasslands provided breathtaking views, and we were fortunate to observe the tahr grazing in their natural habitat.

Exploring Munnar's Valleys: In the afternoon, we explored the valleys surrounding Munnar, which are carpeted with tea plantations. We witnessed the tea plucking process and learned about the different varieties of tea grown in the region. The lush greenery, misty hills, and the aroma of fresh tea leaves created an unforgettable sensory experience.



Day 5: Munnar

Our fifth day began with a visit to the Mattupetty Dam before heading to Cochin.

* St. Francis Church: Our next stop was the St. Francis Church, the oldest European church in India. This historic church holds the remains of the famous explorer Vasco da Gama, who died in Cochin during his third visit to India. * Marine Drive: In the evening, we took a leisurely stroll along the Marine Drive, a picturesque promenade overlooking the Arabian Sea. We learned about the various services offered by the NGO, including residential care, rehabilitation, and skill development programs. We were inspired by their dedication and the positive impact they have on the lives of their beneficiaries.
