

#### 13th October-Registration



# FIELD VISIT

#### FIELD IMMERSION VISIT AND TREK

Section 2 officers undertook village visits across eight states-Uttar Pradesh, Odisha, Rajasthan, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Assam, Maharashtra, and Karnataka. Two villages were selected in one district of each state, with five officers assigned per village. Section 1 officers completed a five-day trek through the scenic Nilgiri hills, experiencing dense forests, varying terrains, and challenging altitudes.



#### MENTAL HEALTH INSTITUTE

OTs visited Institute of Mental Health, Erragadda, gaining insights into mental healthcare delivery. The visit included tours of various wards and a Tele-MANAS Center. Highlights included an interaction with Dr. Christina Z. Chongthu, IAS, on mental health governance, along with a focused session on substance use disorders and the NDPS Act by Dr. Suresh Badamath, Professor of Psychiatry, NIMHANS, Bengaluru.



#### INDUSTRY EXPOSURE

OTs visited CtrlS Datacentre and Global Capability Centre Micron Technologies, exploring India's digital and semiconductor ecosystem. They gained insights into data centre operations, IT infrastructure and semiconductor industry trends, with guided tours and networking sessions.



#### CHERLAPALLY CENTRAL PRISON

Officer Trainees gained an overview of prison administration, correctional services, and inmate welfare. They observed reform initiatives such as vocational training in small-scale manufacturing and textile dyeing, and interacted with officials to understand the human and administrative dimensions of the criminal justice system.



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
