Denotation

- It refers to the meaning of a word.
- denotation of word red is just colour red.
- Denotations are generally restricted meanings.
- to create fresh ideas and images that add deeper levels of meanings to common and ordinary words connotation is used.

Connotations

- Connotations are perceptions or feelings a word conveys, which are distinct from the actual meaning of the words.
- It generally has an emotional connection which can be positive or negative. For example, I am feeling very blue today. Here blue refers to being sad.
- It goes beyond the actual meaning of the word and paints a picture or invokes a feeling.


