

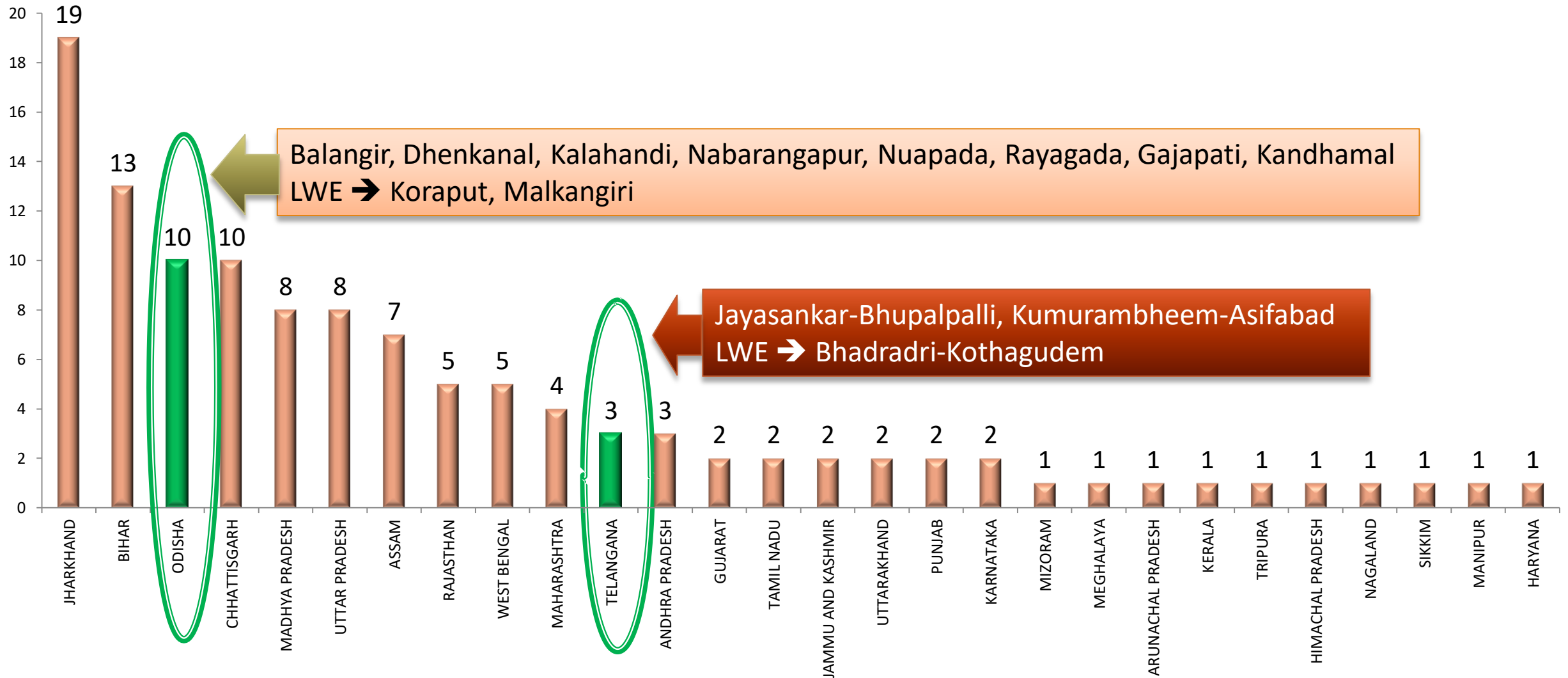

“Transformation of Aspirational Districts Programme”

About the Aspirational District Project

- Launched by Hon'ble Prime Minister in the month of January, 2018 the 'Transformation of Aspirational Districts' Programme (TADP).
- 115 districts from 28 states were selected as aspirational districts
- The program aims to quickly and effectively transform these districts.
- The broad features of the programme are 3-Cs
 - **Convergence** (of Central & State Schemes / funds),
 - **Collaboration** (of Central, State level 'Prabhari' Officers & District Collectors), and
 - **Competition** among districts driven by a mass Movement.
- The program will focus on the strength of each district, identify easily achievable indicators for immediate improvement, measure progress, and rank districts.

The Areas of Focus

- The ‘Transformation of Aspirational Districts’ programme focuses on the 6 thematic areas ...
 - Health & Nutrition,
 - Education,
 - Agriculture & Water Resources,
 - Financial Inclusion &
 - Skill Development, and
 - Basic Infrastructure.
- Each theme has several indicators and data-points which were selected after wide-ranging consultations with the ministries concerned.
- These thematic areas are broadly tuned with Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)
- Weightage, and number of indicators and data-points in each theme is given in Table 1.

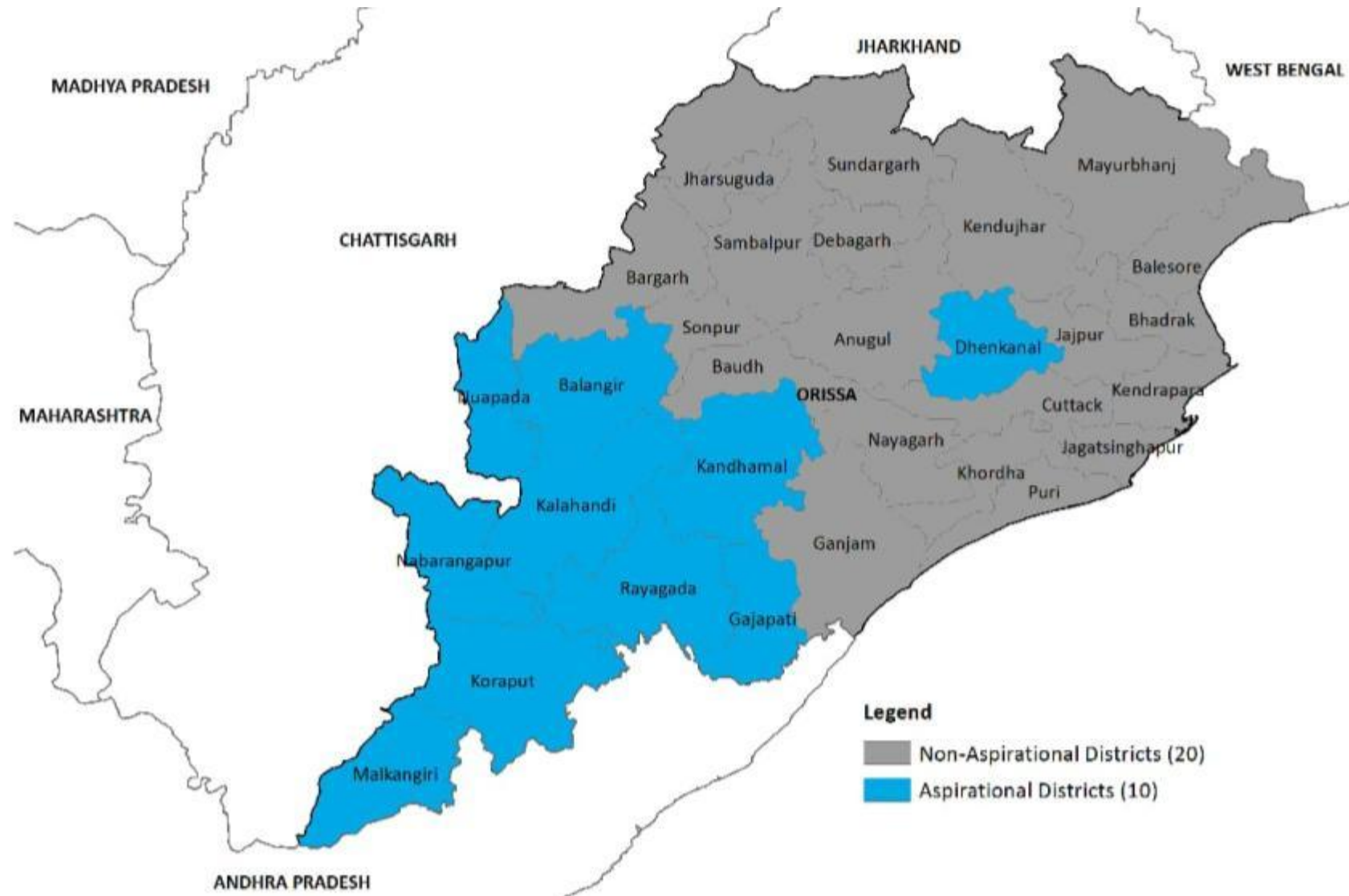

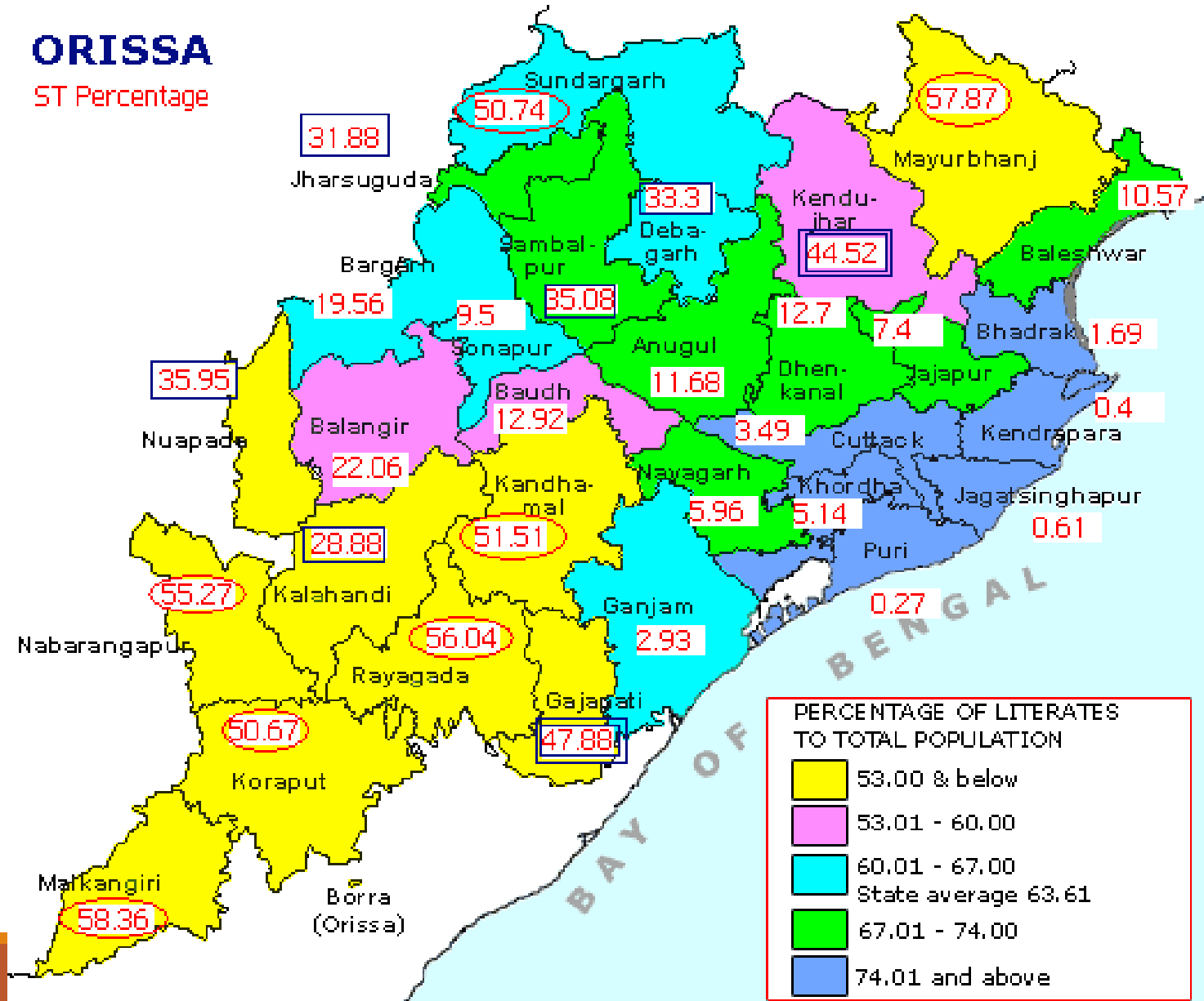

ST percentage Vs Literacy Rates




Odisha Ranking 2018 Vs 2019

Role of District Administration

- Regular Review of each indicator on the current / baseline ranking
- Identify sector wise areas to be improved
- Sector wise SWOT analysis to be carried-out
- Map the weakest mandals based on the indicators / model village~!
- Map financial and human resources available in the districts
- Map resources from State and Centre – identify resource gap
- Prepare action plan for improvisation of weakest pockets / indicators by departments concerned by convergence of funds
- Involve CSR NGOs for resource mobilization and partnerships (Tata Trust)
- Involving PO, ITDA has shown good results in Telangana
- Integrate GPDPs with TADP & SDG Action Plans at grassroots level

Role of IFS Officers in forest and hard to reach pockets

- These pockets are mainly far from conventional growth centres except district headquarter perhaps
- Outmigration is more due to lack of facilities and development
- Need to increase per-capita income by focusing economic activities of individuals not by creating assets
- Assess the Forest Resources, Water Resources and Human Resource
- Soil and Moisture conservation to minimize the amount of water lost from the soils through evaporation
- Increase ground water levels
- Base Camp activities to check illegal forest activities like smuggling, poaching, encroachment etc.
- Local youth get involved in base camps in collection of Minor Forest Produce (Vippa, Beedee Leaf, Gum, Bamboo, honey)
- Skill Development to convert them into final products like products of bamboo (articles), Ippa sweets, gum products and honey etc. [Value Addition]
- Local Women may get involved in nursery maintenance and plantation activities.
- Public Outreach activities aims to connect the interior and hard to reach families to Government Schemes
- **Motivate the all the departmental staff that posting in Aspirational District is not a punishment but its an opportunity.**

Way forward (for State Level)

- Nominate a nodal officer for each sector for regular monitoring
- Ensure flow of funds on priority to these districts and sectors
- Ensure sufficient man power to achieve the desired results
- Include as one of the agenda item in the monthly reviews of the department.
