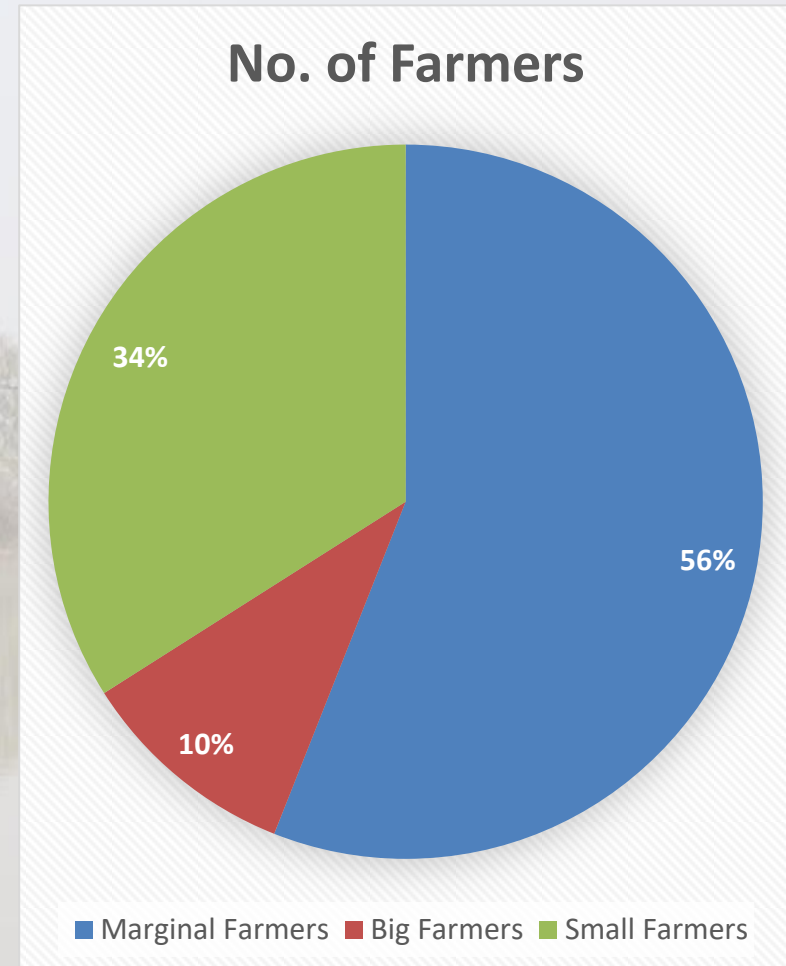

Farmers based on Holding size



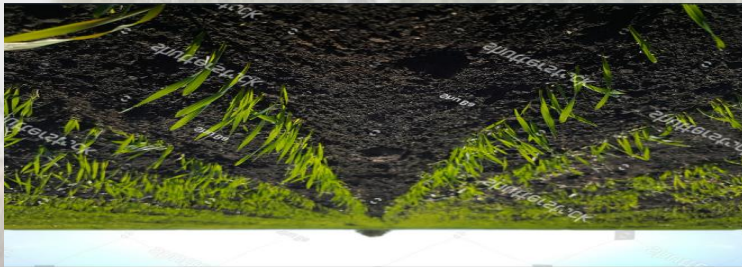

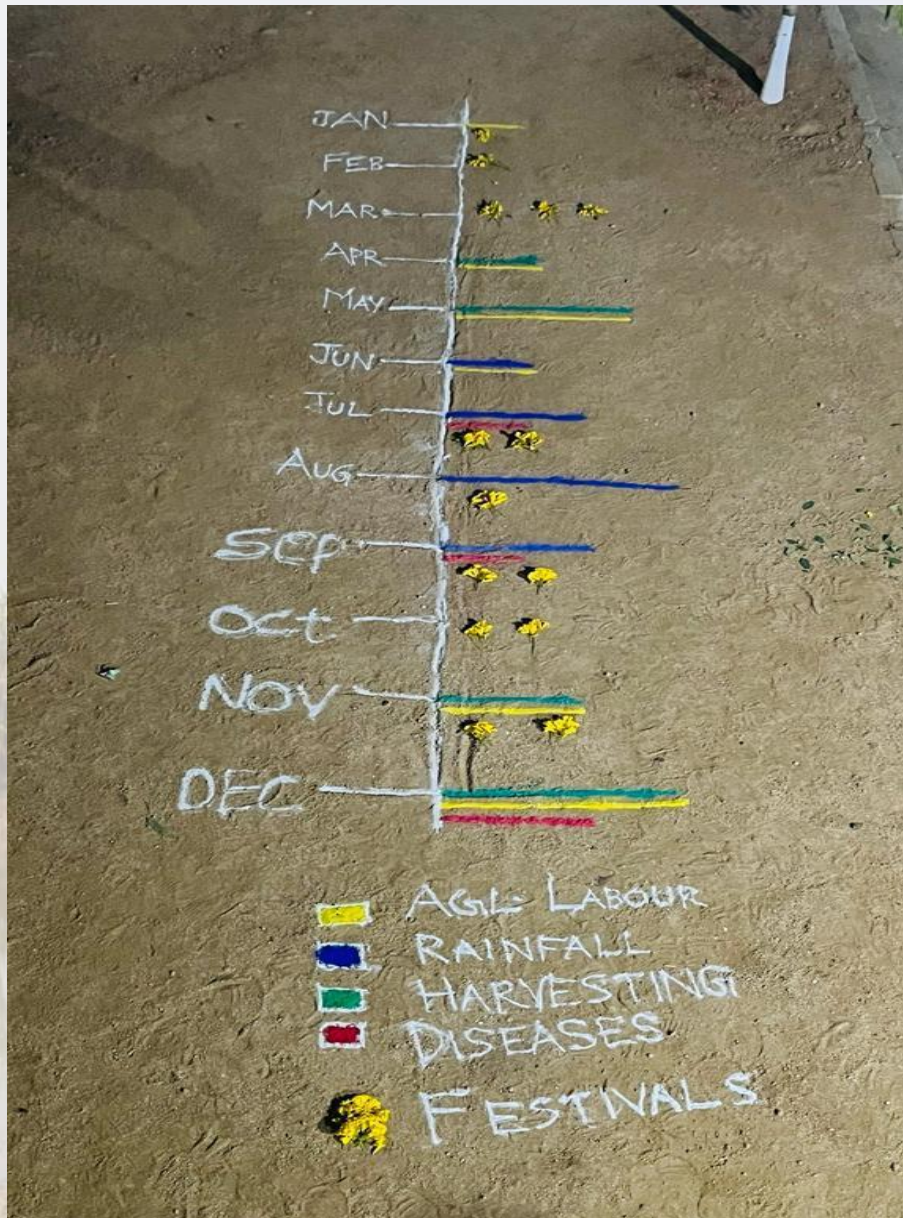

Seasonality trends in the village



- Agricultural labor, Rainfall pattern, Harvesting season, some common diseases and Festivals have been observed.
- The demand for agricultural labor starts from January and it gets picked up in April – May. Again, it starts from June and gets picked up during Nov-Dec.
- Rainfall happens June to September.
- The harvesting period for both the seasons are April – May and Nov – Dec.
- Almost every month some festivals are celebrated. Some of the important festival like Bathukamma is celebrated during Sept – Oct month.

MGNREGS



Major Government schemes

MGNREGS

- Provide at least 100 days wage employment /HH/Yr
- Ensure minimum wage: The notified daily wage rate of Telangana State is Rs. 257 (State CPI-AL)
- Payment is credited within 15 days

Issues:

- Extend the attendance timing from 6 am to 1 pm (Currently it is 6-11 am) because of network issue sometimes complete attendance is not taken in NMMS app.
- More field assistant is required at least one per gram panchayat.
- Link agriculture work with MGNREGS where land holding is less than 5 acres.
- Inclusion of boundary brick wall of open well in MGNREGS
- Because of some technical issues, it is not allowing to remove Aadhaar number from job card after getting married.
- Creation of dry platform to dry harvested paddy crop.

Current Status:

- Total job card holder: 130
- Total active job card holder: 115
- Total wage seekers: 259
- Total active workers: 170
- Total female workers: 104 (61%) and Total male workers: 66 (39%)

Major Government schemes

RYTHU BANDHU

- DBT for inputs to farmers at Rs. 5, 000 per acre per season
- Ensure timely money to buy inputs
- Avoid money lenders

Major Government schemes

RYTHU BIMA

- Cover the life of farmer's family in the event of his/her demise
- Rs. 5.0 lakhs to be paid to the nominee

Current Status:

- One case in 2021 and 2022 respectively.
- 5 lakhs rupees have been credited to the beneficiary timely.
- There is no case in the year 2020

RYTHU VEDIKA

- It is an initiative to bring farmers under one platform and help them attain higher returns.
- There is one Rythu Vedika in the Pandilla village, nearest to Laxmipur. The Rythu vedika was built there for 5 gram panchayats.



Forestation

- In order to improve forestation two of the Government schemes have been implemented successfully in this village.

Telangana Haritha Haram:

- Increase green cover from 24% to 33%
- Active involvement of Gram Panchayats.
- Public Participation.

Current Status:

- No. of plants proposed to be planted: 5500
- No. of plants already planted: 5500
- No. of plants survived: 4800
- Eucalyptus trees have been planted under this scheme. Its chief use is medical, and it constitutes an active ingredient in expectorants and inhalants.



Forestation cont.

Palle Prakruthi Vanams:

- A park for every village.
- Pleasant place for community gathering and physical activities.

Current Status:

- This scheme has launched in 2020. In 2020, one acre land has notified and plantation work has been done under MGNREGS.
- Fund was provided for next 2 years under MGNREGS
- Fund is required for maintenance.





Health

Access to Healthcare:

- Health Sub Centre: Access to Pandilla Gram Panchayat (0.5 KM)
- Primary Health Centre: Access to Srirampur Mandal (3.5 KM)
- ICDS: Nearest Anganwadi Peddampet (0.5 KM)
- Veterinary Dispensary: Access to Srirampur Mandal (3.5 KM)



Village Health Indicators:



- Infant Mortality Rate (Per 1000 population) : 0
- Under 5 Mortality Rate : 0

Positive changes:

- ❑ Open Defection Free Village
- ❑ Residents are actively participating in Swachh Bharat Mission as well as a great **behavioral change** has been observed among villagers in the last two year.
- ❑ Recently the Panchayat office has installed common RO plant to provide **clean drinking water** to each household.

Most common health problems are:

- Hypertension (Age>50)
- Diabetes (Age>50)



Issues



- ❑ The nearest health sub-centre to Lakshampur does not have electricity connection and a functional toilet.

- ❑ Workload on ASHA workers; Task-based salary.





Education

Primary School:

The only formal educational institution of Laxmipur

- ❑ Total Strengths: 20
- ❑ Drop out students: NIL
- ❑ Private school going children from the village: NIL
- ❑ Total number of Teachers: 2
- ❑ Teacher student ratio: 1:10

Mid-Day Meal

- ❑ Mid-day Meal facility is there in the school. But the kitchen is not functional yet. The cook prepares food at her home and bring it to the school.

- ❑ Eggs and other sources of nutrition are seen to be provided to the children.

School Infrastructure:

- ❑ Only two classrooms
 - ❑ 20 students belonging to 5 different standards.
- ❑ There is a water tank available within the premises of the school Campus under mission Bhagirath. So, there is no problem of drinking water.
- ❑ There are separate toilets for both boys and girls within the school premises.
- ❑ There were not adequate number of desks, tables, chairs and fans in the classrooms.
- ❑ There is no complete compound boundary of school.



Assistance from MCRHRD:

During our visit we noticed that there is a lack of basic facilities like fan, desk and other items. So, we have donated two ceiling fans, 10 small desks, one football and distributed a set of stationary items along with some chocolates.



Issues:

No sweeper is assigned for cleaning, children manage themselves.

No separate fund allocation for electricity payment.

Kitchen is not functional. It's been under construction since many years.

There is no compound wall in the school. Currently it's open.

Water Resource

Details

- Water Tanks 3
- Check Dam 1
- Open Wells 50
- Bore Wells 90
- Canals 2



Current Status:

- **Mission Bhagiratha** has been implemented successfully in this village.
- Every house has tap water system, drinking water is supplied from the water tank.
- One RO water plant has also been constructed in the village.
- Nominated for “**Water Sufficient Panchayat Award**”.
- Water Harvesting through Check Dam and Reservoirs.





Sanitation

Current Status:

- Proper Waste Management System.
- Each household has been provided with two dustbins by Gram Panchayat for waste segregation of wet and dry garbage.
- Garbage is collected from each household on daily basis.
- Waste is being segregated at Segregation Shed.
- ODF
- Drinking water tank is cleaned on regular basis.
- Cleanliness drive is organized by us to make aware the villagers.





Self Help Groups (SHG)

Current Status:

- No. of SHG groups- 14 (147 Members)
- 11 groups received loans of Rs. 83,60,000/- in the Financial Year 2022-23
- Equal allocation of loan amount
- The loans received by SHGs are utilized for following purposes:
 - Vegetable farming
 - Higher Studies
 - Dairy
 - Disposable paper plate
 - Shampoo making

Expectations from Government:

- A dedicated place for holding their meetings where all the members can participate.
- Training under skill development.
- Marketing opportunity to sell their self-made products like candles, disposable paper plates, shampoo etc. so that they can increase their income.
- Re-introduce of Aam Adami Yojana for SHGs.

Achievements:

- One woman named P. Pallavi started tent house.
- Higher studies received: 15 person (7-Girls (Engineering))
- In vegetable farming women getting more than 50% profit.
- There has been no case of loan repayment till now.

Challenges:

- No own building for meeting purposes.
- Less skilled training.
- Inability to market their product.



Financial Literacy

Current Status:

- Voluntary Integrated Development Society (VIDS) is an RBI affiliated NGO which creates awareness about financial literacy in the village in every 6 months.
- VIDS works under the supervision of RBI's AGM and District's LDM.
- The awareness program makes villagers informed about various government initiatives like PM Jan Dhan Yojana, RUPAY Card, Atal Pension Yojana, E-shram, Digital Banking, Samajik Suraksha Yojana (SSY), Online Banking, etc.
- Farmers investing money in long term gain crops like palm oil tree, mahogany, teak, sandalwood, dragon fruits tree etc.. for better and long term returns.

- Most faced issue in the village is the lack of public transportation facility (Bus) followed by lack of health infrastructure.
- Apart from these, there are also issues pertaining to financial literacy, lack of educational and road infrastructure which worry the villagers.

Suggestions/Recommendations:

- Renovation of existing health sub centre (Pandilla) Additionally, need of regional medical practitioners (RMP).
- Completion of infrastructure for kitchen and compound wall in primary school.
- Tourist spot development alongside of check dam of Rayapeta.
- Government initiative to promote sustainable crops like Dragon fruit, Mahogany etc.
- Construction of road from pandilla to odela temple via abbidipalli. Currently this is kutchra road and has not been constructed since independence.
- Own building for self-help group to conduct meeting and smooth functioning.
- Availability of regular public transport, given its financial viability.
